Think you might qualify?

All college students must meet the <u>SNAP eligibility criteria</u> to receive food assistance.

If you're enrolled half-time or more, you must also meet **at least ONE** of the following <u>conditions</u>:

- Work 20+ hours per week
- Participate in a federal or state work-study program
- Have a physical or mental disability or condition that prevents you from working
- Care for a young dependent child
- Receive Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)
- Enrolled in college through certain employment & training programs, such as SNAP E&T, Workforce and Innovation Opportunity Act (WIOA), and others
- Participate in an on-the-job training program
- Be under age 18 or over 49
